

One in 23 teenage girls had an abortion

What can be done to cut teenage pregnancy rates?

The figures have prompted° Conservative claims that Labour’s sex education policy had failed and that young women were being offered abortions in some areas as a form of contraception.

Documents in the Commons library show that rates of teenage pregnancy and abortion among under-18s differ wildly across the country, with the highest in London and parts of the North.

The figures show that the south London borough of Lambeth has the highest rate of teenage abortion, with 44 in every 1,000 girls – one in 23 – having an abortion in 2006. Other parts of London also record a much higher teenage abortion rate than the average for England and Wales, which is one for every 55 teenage girls per year.

In 2006, 17,173 of 193,737 abortions carried out in England and Wales involved girls below the age of 18. Sixty per cent of pregnancies among under-

16s ended in termination, along with 49 per cent of those aged 16 and 17.

In Southwark, the figure is one in 25 – in nearby Lewisham it is one in 31. Other areas recording higher-than-average rates include Darlington in Co Durham, with one in 37 girls having an abortion and Blackpool where the figure is one in 40.

The Tories^o said the figures showed that high rates of teenage pregnancy and abortion were endemic in Labour-controlled areas. They claimed the rate was drastically lower in most Tory areas, even when differing prosperity^o levels were factored in. In Buckinghamshire, one in 71 teenage girls had an abortion, and in Westminster, it was one in 67.

Nadine Dorries, Conservative MP^o for mid-Bedfordshire, where the rate is one in 63, said: “These horrific statistics highlight the extent to which abortion is seen as just another form of contraception.

“Some of the most disadvantaged areas of the country, under Labour control have the highest rate of teenage pregnancy and abortion and highlight the total failure of government policy.”

Miss Dorries, who has campaigned since becoming an MP for changes to abortion law, is preparing amendments^o to the Human Fertilisation and Embryology Bill^o to bring the upper limit at which abortion can legally take place down from 24 weeks to 20.

She has the support of David Cameron who has said he will vote for the limit to come down to 20 or 21 weeks.

However, despite being a free vote issue, most Labour MPs remain strongly pro-abortion and are unlikely to support the changes.

Miss Dorries said the latest evidence showed the need for change. “We now know that abortion leads to depression and mental health problems in later life, along with other complications in future pregnancies.

“The failure of government policy in some of the poorest areas in Britain has subjected young girls who have the least ability to access help advice and support to a lifetime of further problems.

“The government is in fact the architect of rising abortion rates. They have a duty of care to the most disadvantaged in society, and they have failed in that duty of care and let young women down badly.”
