*Frankenstein's youngest brother, William, has been murdered.*
4. What does Frankenstein see just outside the gates of Geneva as he is returning home?  
*He sees the monster he has created.*
5. Who is accused of committing the murder, and why?  
*Justine, who lives with the family, is accused. She is not with the family on the night William is murdered. Several people see her the next morning looking confused and frightened. A servant finds the locket that Elizabeth has given to William in Justine's pocket.*
6. What is Frankenstein's reaction to this accusation?  
*He is sure the creature has committed the murder. He is torn between wanting to save Justine and not wanting to reveal his horrible secret to anyone. He considers himself the real murderer.*
7. What does Frankenstein do about his dilemma?  
*He appeals to the courts to let Justine go free, and tells his family that she is innocent, but he does not tell anyone about the creature.*
8. What happens to the accused person?  
*She confesses under pressure from her priest. She is convicted and hanged.*
9. What is Frankenstein's state of mind after the trial and its conclusion?  
*He is filled with remorse for all he has done. He is also fearful that the creature will commit other crimes.*
10. Where does Frankenstein go to seek relief?  
*He travels to the Alpine valley and the village of Chamounix.*
